1. Call to Order

Mr. Vogler called the meeting to order at 5:31 p.m.

2. Election of MPO Chairman for 2023

Mr. Vogler stated that MPO the Chairman for 2023 would be from Pittsylvania County, and he nominated Mr. Bob Warren as Chairman. Mr. Dunevant voted to second that nomination, and the motion was voted upon and approved unanimously.

3. Election of MPO Vice-Chairman for 2023

Mr. Vogler stated that the nomination process for MPO Vice-Chairman for 2023 would be from the City of Danville. He opened the floor to nominations, and Mr. Gillie nominated Mr. Vogler. Mr. Dunevant voted to second that nomination, and the motion was voted upon and approved unanimously.

4. Approval of Minutes from the August 24, 2022 and November 9, 2022 meetings

Mr. Vogler asked for a motion to approve the minutes from the August 24, 2022 and November 9, 2022 MPO Policy Board meetings. Mr. Gillie made a motion to approve the minutes, which was seconded by Mr. Dunevant. The motion was voted upon and approved unanimously.

5. Update on South Ridge Street Study, Bill Wuensch, EPR, PC

Mr. Wuensch stated that the topic of his presentation would be to identify a new or improved connection between Goodyear Boulevard and downtown, which he noted his team initiated at the end of 2022. He added that the intent of the new connector was to relieve traffic along the Craghead Street corridor, improve travel capacity between Goodyear Boulevard and downtown, and enhance multimodal mobility. He further added that the team proposed creating a road typical section that would contextually adhere to abutting development.

Mr. Wuensch discussed various considerations that would be looked at in terms of providing a new connector. At the end of the study, he noted, his team would provide documents on methodology, improvements that would be recommended, and bridge limits and type, among other information. Mr. Wuensch added that his team had been working on the mapping aspect, and that a link to a GIS storyboard was contained in a handout, which would also be useful for possible future public outreach.

Mr. Wuensch stated that a study work group took place on February 2nd, at which a new alignment that was anticipated to heavily impact the Monument-Berryman neighborhood was discussed. Since then, he noted, attention had shifted from the construction of a new alignment to focusing more on Monument Avenue and potentially other alignments. He added that travel demand forecasts considering the new alignment had been prepared, and that a new alignment would accommodate approximately 2,500 vehicles per day on a two-lane rather than a four-lane configuration; this, he added, would help to relieve Craghead Street traffic.

Mr. Wuensch stated that next steps would include finalizing travel demand forecasts and exploring alternative alignments to accommodate additional travel throughput. He added that the project timeline would extend through the end of September. Mr. Vogler asked at which point during the study visual renderings would be developed, to which Mr. Wuensch replied that these should be available by the end of April or May.

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6. Adoption of Remote Electronic Participation and All-Virtual meeting Policy, Michael Armbrister, MPO Administrator

Mr. Armbrister stated that this policy would be very similar to that which had been adopted by the WPPDC Board the previous week. To facilitate the MPO's compliance with the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), he added, it was desirable to enable Board members to participate virtually, or for the MPO to hold an all-virtual meeting. He added that the MPO policy would incorporate language from the Code of Virginia to guide Policy Board members regarding virtual attendance. For individual members who needed to meet for a personal reason, he stated, each member would be limited to two meetings per year or 25 percent of meetings – whichever was greater. For the MPO as a full body, fully virtual meetings would be limited to two meetings per year or 25 percent of meetings, whichever was greater. Mr. Vogler asked for a motion to approve this policy, and Mr. Gillie made a motion to approve, which was seconded by Mr. Dunevant. The motion was voted upon and approved unanimously.

7. Adoption of 2023 MPO Self-Certification, Michael Armbrister

Mr. Armbrister stated that the MPO adopted self-certification provisions annually, which certified that the MPO was adhering to Title VI and other non-discrimination laws. Mr. Dunevant made a motion to approve the 2023 MPO Self-Certification, which was seconded by Mr. Gillie. The motion was voted upon and approved unanimously.

8. Approval of Draft FY2024 – 2027 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Mr. Armbrister noted that MPO staff developed the FY 2024 – 2027 TIP, which would be in effect for the following four fiscal years. He stated that the TIP was federally mandated and encompassed all federally-funded projects within the MPO footprint. He added that Fiscal Year 2024 projects within the FY 2021 – 2024 TIP would overlap with the FY 2024 – 2027 TIP, so that any revisions for FY 24 would need to apply to both documents. He further added that staff reviewed the FY 2024 – 2027 TIP but did not have any comments. Mr. Armbrister noted that the Board's approval was needed to enable the public input process to begin, which had been scheduled from March 12th through April 12th and followed by an April 12th public hearing. He concluded by stating that MPO staff recommended approval of the document. A motion to approve the FY 2024 – 2027 TIP was made by Mr. Gillie, and was seconded by Mr. Winstead. The motion was voted upon and approved unanimously.

9. Update on Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant, Joe Bonanno, Senior Planner

Mr. Bonanno stated that the MPO had been awarded Safe Streets for All grant funding, for which the MPO had applied in 2022 to improve safety and reduce fatalities throughout the MPO area. He noted that the total amount of the grant would be \$200,000, though the federal portion would be \$160,000, and the remaining 20 percent would comprise \$30,000 from the City of Danville and \$10,000 from Pittsylvania County. He added that funding would be used to develop a safety Action Plan, and he described the components the plan would include. Mr. Armbrister added that he and Mr. Bonanno participated in a webinar pertaining to this grant, that it may be 45 days before a draft agreement could be developed, and that there may be a period of time before the agreement would be finalized. He concluded by noting that, as the applicant, the WPPDC would administer this grant, and that it would be several months before the WPPDC was under contract.

10. Update on TAZ Process, Joe Bonanno

Mr. Bonanno stated that the MPO was in the process of beginning to update the MPO area's Transportation Analysis Zones (TAZ). He described what TAZs were, noting that they served as the basis for transportation modeling. He stated that a TAZ would be added as part of this update to account for part of the Southern Virginia Mega Site at Berry Hill that was not included in past update iterations. Mr. Bonanno stated that Mr. Cook recommended that the MPO make a case for the Weldon Cooper Center for Public Service to maintain the current MPO population to the year 2050 to account for population growth that was taking place and was expected to occur in the City of Danville. Mr. Bonanno stated that he had contacted the City of Danville regarding this, and he asked Mr. Gillie about growth rates in various areas of the City. Mr. Gillie replied that he had discussed this with City staff, and that he and City staff would like to obtain accurate figures on growth, after which they would contact the MPO with feedback.

11. Comments/Updates from VDOT/DRPT/FHWA

Mr. Winstead asked Mr. Youngblood or Mr. Cook if either of them had any updates. Mr. Youngblood stated that the Smart Scale draft funding scenario had been released and was currently in review, and that public hearings were approaching. He added that Danville did well in terms of initial project selection, noting that the STARS studies contributed to Danville's success. Mr. Cook thanked Mr. Bonanno and Mr. David Rakes for their work on the TAZ update, and he noted that he was interested to see whether the conversation with the Weldon Cooper Center would be fruitful. He added that there was a case to be made for growth, or at least less of a decline than was projected. Mr. Bonanno added that he was happy to see that the sidewalk project in the Piedmont Drive area was recommended for Smart Scale funding, and he referenced an article that suggested potential future mixed-use development at the site of Danville Mall. Mr. Cook added that the sidewalk application resulted from the recent VDOT Project Pipeline, and that this was the first Smart Scale round for which the land use factor was included in the scoring. Mr. Winstead stated that of the projects within the Lynchburg District that were recommended for funding, six of them were in Danville, accounting for \$80 million of \$120 million allocated to projects within the Lynchburg District. He added that a CTB public

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hearing was anticipated during the spring, which would serve as an opportunity for the MPO and the City to advocate on behalf of these recommended projects.

Ms. Dubinsky, of DRPT, mentioned a grant workshop that took place on February 15th which focused on upcoming grant opportunities. She added that DRPT offered planning grants throughout the year, noting that the agency provided a technical assistance grant that required a 50 percent match. She added that FY 24 grant funding announcements should be made in late April.

12. Other Business

Mr. Vogler followed up with VDOT staff about the possibility of adding rumble strips to Mount Cross Road, to which Mr. Youngblood replied that Mount Cross Road did not currently adhere to prioritization for rumble strips, according to a conversation he had with a traffic engineer. Mr. Vogler asked whether the need for rumble strips was based on accidents or head-on collisions, to which Mr. Youngblood replied that he would send additional information to him, via Mr. Armbrister. Mr. Vogler then asked about the possibility of rumble strips on Berry Hill Road, to which Mr. Youngblood replied that this road would qualify for that retrofit.

13. Adjourn

The meeting was adjourned at 6:07 p.m.

APPROVAL OF THE DANVILLE MPO UNIFIED TRANSPORTATION PLANNING WORK PROGRAM FISCAL YEAR 2024

At a meeting of the Danville Urbanized Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) held on March 1, 2023, the following Resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, for Fiscal Year 2024, \$163,280 in PL funds, including provision for state and for local matching amounts from Danville and Pittsylvania County, are anticipated to be available to the Danville MPO; and

WHEREAS, of the \$163,280 in PL funds, \$76,483 are to be contracted to the West Piedmont Planning District Commission for ongoing administration, consultant management, PL-supported planning activity and support, transit planning, and other responsibilities arising under the FY 2024 Unified Transportation Planning Work Program (UPWP); and

WHEREAS, the FY 2024 work program includes consultant-led studies as described in the UPWP subject to review and approval by the VDOT and FHWA; and

WHEREAS, the Virginia Department of Transportation will be contributing its efforts to MPO work elements, including assisting in the review of corridors studies and other tasks, on behalf of the Danville MPO during FY 2024; and

WHEREAS, the City of Danville and Pittsylvania County agree to provide their appropriate share for the general administration, technical, and consultant work funded through use of PL funds; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Danville Urbanized Area MPO hereby adopts and requests VDOT and FHWA approval of its FY 2024 Unified Transportation Planning Work Program (UPWP) in the total project amounts of \$163,280 inclusive of matching amounts and with provision for funding the WPPDC/MPO administration, consultants, and MPO/City of Danville transit planning efforts.

Unified Transportation Planning Work Program (UPWP)

Introduction and Summary of Planning Process

Structure/General Organization

The Unified Transportation Planning Work Program (UPWP) defines the transportation planning processes and programs used by the Metropolitan Planning Organization and is normally developed and adopted on an annual basis. The overall authority for transportation planning in the Metropolitan Planning Area is in the hands of the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) which is made up of locally elected and administrative officials of the local government members (City of Danville and County of Pittsylvania) and representation from the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT); these members make up the Policy Board and are the voting entity for the MPO. There are seven eligible votes on the Policy Board: three from the City, three from the County, and one from the Virginia Department of Transportation. The City, County, and VDOT have provided for alternate voting members from staff and administration. The MPO also has a Project Management Team (PMT) appointed by the MPO Chairman that is primarily administrative and planning personnel from the area; the PMT is the MPO's technical committee.

Planning Sources and Processes

With the establishment of the MPO, the Danville-Pittsylvania County area has available to it an organization for transportation planning which can provide a forum and instrumentality to bring together comprehensive and cooperative planning approaches that may lead to new, worthwhile project alternatives. These project ideas may eventually find their way into a transportation improvement program (TIP) at some future point in time if funding can be identified for their implementation. The planning efforts managed by the MPO include provisions for citizen participation.

Environmental Justice is an outgrowth of an Executive Order signed by President Clinton in 1994. The Executive Order augments Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 by making the prohibition of discrimination based on race, color, and national origin more specific. It addresses persons belonging to Black, Hispanic, Asian American, American Indian, Alaskan Native, and low-income groups. The intent of environmental justice is to improve transportation planning and decision-making by including all public groups in the planning process. Specifically, Metropolitan Planning Organizations are expected to enhance public participation by eliminating participation barriers and engaging minority and low-income populations in making transportation decisions. To assure success of this process, the needs of these groups must be identified. This can be accomplished in part by identifying residential, employment, and transportation patterns of low-income and minority populations. By identifying these factors, impacts and benefits of transportation investments can be more equitably allocated. To complete the process of identifying these needs, it is necessary to engage these groups in planning discussions and meetings to the extent practicable.

To help explain environmental justice, the Executive Order and the U.S. Department of Transportation present three fundamental principles. These principles are:

- 1. To avoid, minimize, or mitigate disproportionately high and adverse human health and environmental effects, including social and economic effects on minority populations and low-income populations.
- 2. To ensure the full and fair participation by all potentially affected communities in the transportation decision-making process.
- 3. To prevent the denial of, reduction in, or significant delay in the receipt of benefits by minority and low-income populations.

The Danville MPO is meeting these principals by continually examining the location and service area of each of its transportation improvements to ensure that its transportation system adequately and appropriately benefits all groups of the Region's population. The MPO is also providing direct notice to as many entities representing the various groups, including groups representing disabled and underserved persons in the Region as is practicable. The MPO will also hold public meetings and other activities in facilities that are centrally located and accessible by as many transportation modes as possible. Additionally, the MPO will make available meeting materials in Spanish, and the MPO uses CyraCom for translation and interpretation services. The MPO will continue its work in complying with the Environmental Justice regulations by utilizing data provided by the 2020 Census and the socio-economic data base developed for the LRTP update. The transportation system's effectiveness in serving the Region's minority and low-income groups is being evaluated by using this data in the development of maps that show concentrations of the minority and low-income segments of the population in the Region.

The UWP in the Process

The UWP attempts to set out the planning efforts being undertaken by the various entities of which it has knowledge. To date, the primary efforts listed originate with citizens, the local governments, VDOT and the MPO Policy Board. Project development and recommended planning project activity generally proceeds through Project Management Team consideration and then to the MPO Board, which, after consultation, makes final changes and project selection.

UWP and the TIP

As implied, the UWP annually sets out a compendium of transportation planning activities for which authorization and funding support is to be sought. Activities included normally are presented on a one-year schedule. The MPO Policy Board is also responsible for developing the annual TIP.

The projects considered in the TIP are different from those in the UWP. Items for inclusion in the TIP are done in the following ways:

• They have reached the project level;

- They involve capital improvements;
- They have been selected for implementation;
- Funding sources have been determined; and
- They cover an extended time period typically of three years.

The UWP is a planning activities administration tool, whereas the TIP sets out a schedule of actual projects for implementation. Projects in the TIP may also be end products of planning work carried out under the UWP.

Meeting National Goals for Transportation Planning

The UWP and the planning process it engenders allows the MPO to participate in and meet requirements from the national perspective of conducting a *Continuing, Cooperative,* and *Comprehensive* transportation planning process that results in plans and programs that consider all modes of transportation and support metropolitan community development and social goals. This is widely known as the "3-C Process."

Current and Future UWP Activities and Facing the Future Issues

As noted the MPO has engaged in a number of short-range planning activities. Historically the MPO has undertaken numerous short-range projects such as corridor studies, intersection studies, and transportation development plan updates. In the future it is anticipated that the MPO through the UWP specified activities will continue to undertake short-range type planning activities to manage congestion and monitor for Long-Range Transportation Plan update needs depending on availability of financial support for the planning activities. The MPO will also be expected to work with the Commonwealth and federal agencies, as deemed appropriate, in implementing the guidelines and programs under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and other applicable federal transportation policies.

The MPO will follow the implementation and will seek opportunities to capitalize on the BIL adopted in November 2021. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, passed as the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, provides long-term funding for surface transportation infrastructure planning and investment, including increased funding over the previous FAST Act. The BIL authorizes \$567.5 billion over fiscal years 2022 through 2026 for all modes of transportation administered by the U.S. Department of Transportation. This includes \$274.1 billion in new funding. The BIL maintains a focus on safety, keeps intact the established structure of the various highway-related programs, and continues efforts to streamline project delivery.

The Danville MPO understands the importance of utilizing Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) in the procurement process and will make its best effort to utilize DBEs on third-party contracts.

Primary issues facing the area include how best to redesign and improve the transportation system and, at the same time, ensure that necessary funds will be available to undertake the physical projects needed. The key question is whether there will be funds available to undertake the physical improvements that are ultimately prompted from the planning process.

FY23 Work Plan Tasks

During this fiscal year, the following activities will be pursued by MPO and VDOT staff:

Task 1.0 Administration and Maintenance of the Transportation Planning Process

1.01 General Administration and Operations

Description: This task includes ongoing activities to ensure the proper management and operations of the continuing, comprehensive, and coordinated (3-C) planning process. The objectives of this task are to implement the FY 2024 UPWP throughout the fiscal year; provide all required administrative functions including accounting, personnel, contract, and office administration; and support the activities of the Danville MPO through preparation of agenda, attendance, scheduling meetings, reports, minutes, and other duties as needed for the MPO Policy Board and subcommittees such as the Project Management Team/Technical Advisory Committee.

End Products:

- Prepare meeting agenda; minutes; resolutions; arrange for and/or attend meetings, conferences, and training.
- Preparation for and attendance at the MPO Policy Board meetings.
- Preparation for and attendance at Project Management Team (Technical Committee) meetings or WebEx meetings, including any work for special committees.
- Process PL funding requests; VDOT preparation and/or review of PL and PL Pass-through funding agreements and addenda.
- Review local and regional transportation planning activities and attend public hearings conducted by the MPO as needed.
- Develop and employ mechanisms for accommodation of MPO transportation planning activities with guidelines for Environmental Justice and with regulations for Title VI of Civil Rights Act. Efforts can include: developing process to evaluate disproportionate impacts and distribution of benefits and burdens of plans and programs on low-income and minority populations; establishing procedure to assess low-income and minority population in the planning process; incorporate Environmental Justice efforts in the UPWP. MPO staff will seek out and continue to participate in a Title VI Civil Rights training activity during FY 24.

- Prepare and execute funding agreements and contracts, including contract extensions or supplements, as needed.
- Prepare and review progress, financial, and other supportive reports; VDOT: review and process quarterly billing invoices and progress reports.
- In FY 24, in the interest of improving public access to MPO transportation planning activities, the new standalone MPO website will be maintained and updated, incorporating transportation activities, programs, studies, reports, meetings, and other items of public interest.
- Review as necessary, consultant contracts or supplements and monitor consultant contracts, negotiations, and work progress on MPO-sponsored transportation planning and studies employing consultants.
- Respond to requests for intergovernmental reviews and their coordination with the West Piedmont Planning District Commission.
- Review proposed enhancement projects as requested.
- Employ training, courses, seminars, and conferences to enhance the transportation planning and administration skills of staff and/or Policy Board, Project Management Team/Technical Advisory Committee.

Completion date: Ongoing/Continuing in FY 2024

Budget: \$15,000 Staff: \$15,000

1.02 Reporting and Compliance with MPO Required Tasks, Regulations

Description: This task includes all activities associated with annual development and maintenance of the annual MPO work program (UPWP) and Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), including amendments, as well as any necessary and required updates to the 2045 Long-Range Plan.

End Products:

- Process amendments to FY 2024 Unified Transportation Work Program (UWP) and prepare the FY 2025 UWP.
- Develop and process as necessary amendments to the FY 2021-2024 and FY 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Programs (TIPs) as requested by VDOT.

Completion date: Continuing/Ongoing FY 2024

Budget: \$7,000 Staff: \$7,000

Task 2.0 Long-Range Transportation Planning and Surveillance

2.01 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Maintenance

Description: During FY 2024, MPO staff will continue to coordinate, maintain, and amend as necessary the Long-Range Transportation Plan updated to the Year 2045, completed in the first quarter FY 2021; b) Evaluate any requests or needs for modification of the Long-Range Transportation Plan, including responding to BIL requirements and preparing for future updates.

End Products:

- Public assistance and information.
- Updates and amendments to keep Plan current.

Completion date: Ongoing in FY 24 Budget: \$1,000 Staff: \$1,000

2.02 Consultant Led Studies in Support of Long-Range Planning Efforts

Description: The MPO has provided for the potential of initiating local transportation planning efforts to assist the City of Danville and Pittsylvania County with their needs and supporting the continual ongoing development of projects that derive from the Long-Range Transportation Plan and its recommendations list. An engineer consultant firm(s) will be procured to develop studies as approved by the MPO Policy Board.

Ongoing and new studies may be conducted by a single consultant (team) for consistency. However, dependent upon the bidding/scoping process or contract award under the PDC/MPO on-call engineering consultant, multiple consultants may be contracted to maximize the available funding or to draw upon specific expertise. Following the bidding/scoping process, a selection committee will make a recommendation to the MPO Policy Board for consideration.

Consultant agreements will include provision for end products to be provided as a deliverable for the project. If budgeted funds are insufficient to accomplish all the items listed in the FY 24 work plan, the required balance for funding will be programmed in the FY 25 UPWP if desired by the MPO Policy Board.

In Fiscal Year 2022, the MPO was awarded a Growth & Accessibility Planning (GAP) Technical Assistance Program grant, which was used to create a tool for identifying and prioritizing

transportation studies that support VTrans and regional goals. The tool was completed in June 2022 and is used to identify, evaluate, and prioritize future MPO studies.

Current Consultant-Led Study:

Extension of South Ridge Street (City of Danville): Extend South Ridge Street from its current dead-end at Newton Street east to Industrial Avenue to develop a more comprehensive street network in Danville's River District, to accommodate additional traffic generated by new commercial, residential, and mixed-use developments.

Safe Streets and Roads for All Project:

In Fiscal Year 2023, West Piedmont Planning District Commission, on behalf of the Danville MPO, was awarded a Safe Streets and Roads for All planning grant. This planning project will commence in Fiscal Year 2024.

Future Consultant-Led Studies:

Norfolk-Southern Railroad Crossing at West Main Street (City of Danville): This study is needed to address a safety issue pertaining to a single Norfolk-Southern railroad track that crosses West Main Street in the vicinity of Gatewood Drive. The track currently includes warning signage and flashing lights, but no safety gates. With a new casino under development farther east along West Main Street and potential other development that has the likelihood to increase traffic volumes along this corridor, it is likely that this railroad crossing would pose a greater safety risk to the traveling public. Therefore, a study is needed to determine how best to address this safety concern.

U.S. Route 58 East (South Boston Road) from Danville Regional Airport east to the eastern MPO boundary (City of Danville and Pittsylvania County): This study would evaluate safety, functionality, and multimodal transportation needs and formulate recommendations thereunto along the U.S. Route 58 corridor between Danville Regional Airport and the eastern MPO boundary.

West Main Street between the limits of former Dewberry Study (Schoolfield) and U.S. Route 29 Interchange (City of Danville): Include study of and potential improvements to the West Main Street corridor as a priority in the next update of the Danville MPO Long-Range Transportation Plan. Subsequent to that, a study will be needed to identify safety, functionality, and multimodal travel needs and to formulate relevant recommendations along the corridor. Need for this study will be greater in the near future, given the current development of a casino along this corridor, as well as other future nearby developments that will likely influence traffic volumes along the corridor. End Product: Corridor study reports including supporting graphs, pictures, maps, drawings, and other pertinent statistical data.

Completion Date: 4th Quarter of FY 24

Budget: \$114,080 Staff: \$27,283 Consultant: \$86,797

2.03 VTRANS/Multi-Modal Planning Support

Description: Assist VDOT District Office and Central Office with the dissemination of the completed documents regarding the final VTRANS, the Statewide Multimodal Plan, and the Surface Transportation Plan initiatives including stakeholder outreach activities to produce public understanding of the contents and utility of the VTRANS and associated planning efforts and the related documents.

End Products:

- Assist TMPD staff on any public involvement support needed for any updates;
- Provide representation to the VTRANS Multimodal Advisory Committee.

Completion date: Ongoing in FY 2024

Budget: \$4,000 Staff: \$4,000

2.04 Freight Planning

Description: Assist VDOT staff with freight planning under VTRANS: 1) with data collection from any needed survey effort required of the MPO; 2) with public involvement and participation efforts in Plan document updates.

- Data collection from a survey if needed
- Public involvement and participation assistance as requested by TMPD.

Completion date: Continuing FY 2024

2.05 Response to BIL and Other Federal Requirements

Description: MPO staff to work cooperatively with the Virginia Department of Transportation and Federal Highway Administration-Richmond staffs, as necessary in accommodation to the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and other pertinent federal transportation policies -- based requirements needed for the MPO to attain full compliance. The staff, with help from the FHWA and VDOT, will also want to monitor, maintain, and improve upon the Public Involvement Program that the MPO uses in its operations.

Fiscal Year 2024 activities will be flexible to be responsive to any demands placed on the MPO with the advent of the BIL or other federal requirements. MPOs will need to monitor new policy directives in the CFRs of public comments and responses as well as the final regulatory actions generated subsequent to the federal public involvement/comment process.

In an effort to meet objectives identified by the FTA and the FHWA, the MPO will explore opportunities to transition to Performance Based Planning and Programming. Possible activities may include working with local planning partners to identify how to implement performance-based planning provisions such as collecting performance data, selecting, and reporting performance targets on reporting actual system performance related to identified targets. The MPO will seek the guidance from the Lynchburg District VDOT Planning Staff and the FHWA staff in considering these possible initiatives.

End Products:

- Maintaining reconciliation of MPO's transportation planning processes for compliance with the BIL and other applicable federal regulations. Work may include other planning efforts with State agencies to meet the regulations and fulfill required planning efforts.
- Revise, as necessary, the Public Involvement Process to comply with BIL requirements. An end product aiding this will be:
 - a) Development of recommendations for implementation of improvements to public involvement efforts.

Completion date: Continuing in FY 2024

Budget: \$9,200 Staff: \$9,200

Task 3.0 Technical Assistance

3.01 General Development and Comprehensive Planning

Description: This task allows for assistance to MPO localities on transportation-related activities on an individual basis or MPO basis, as needed.

This task includes but is not limited to:

- Providing transportation planning and plan development assistance, transportation technical input, and resources to the MPO's localities to improve the overall effectiveness and efficiency of the transportation network;
- Assessing the impact of major developments and other significant land use changes on the transportation system;
- Assisting with the update of local comprehensive plans to ensure land use and other elements are consistent with the statewide and MPO transportation plans and other planning documents;
- PDC Staff will compile all available and future land use GIS layers/attribute data from local comprehensive plans within the Planning District Commission boundaries. The staff will use the GIS tool provided by VDOT-TMPD to geo-reference local transportation plan recommendations. The PDC staff will coordinate and utilize the assistance provided or as needed from VDOT-TMPD in accomplishing this task.
- Assisting with other duties as requested by VDOT, FHWA, and the MPO, including participation in the NEPA process for transportation projects.

In an effort to ensure its effectiveness in regional planning the MPO will consider or revisit if applicable its metropolitan area planning agreements with area local governments or other area MPO's to facilitate to the greatest possible extent cross-jurisdictional communication among the VDOT, MPO's, and area local governments to improve collaboration, policy implementation, technology use, and performance management.

The MPO will place emphasis on exploring opportunities to identify and address gaps in transportation access to essential services such as health care, employment, education, and recreation. The MPO will explore opportunities to reach underserved populations by evaluating its public participation plans with the intent of communicating with and more effectively involving disadvantaged populations in the transportation planning process.

- Assist with developing regional consensus on priorities of highway, transit, bicycle and pedestrian projects for consideration by the Commonwealth Transportation Board for inclusion in the Six-Year Improvement Program.
- The MPO staff will monitor and attempt to exercise measures to promote Safety Conscious Planning in the current and future fiscal years.
- Review road plans for conformance with current transportation plans; assist with area and District-wide planning for Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) and higher levels of technology for project developments in the future.

- MPO staff work on GIS, CTPP Data for distribution and utilization related to transportation planning projects, studies, and coordinate as appropriate.
- If requested, coordinate multi-modal study activities and maintain necessary transportation inventories, including bicycles or bicycle paths.
- Evaluate and review special situations such as: major traffic generators, site plans, elderly and handicapped needs, and any needs for Paratransit projects.
- Continuous review of current transportation plan(s) for consideration of additional TSM improvements such as traffic engineering, fringe parking lots, bicycle and pedestrian facilities, goods movement, and vehicle occupancy.
- Assisting VDOT and other Commonwealth transportation agencies in development of statewide plans to meet federal requirements or the requests of the Office of the Governor or in order to respond to General Assembly legislation.
- Assist City and County in developing project needs for inclusion in their Comprehensive Plan's Transportation Elements Chapter.
- Provide VDOT GIS layers and any other related data obtained from the City of Danville and Pittsylvania County relating to parcel index, future land use, etc.

End Products: Reports, correspondence, work papers, mapping or other work products generated in the course of staff provision of general technical assistance

Completion date: Continuing FY 2024 Budget: \$10,000 Staff: \$10,000

VDOT-TMPD Support to MPOs:

VDOT's Transportation and Mobility Planning Division (TMPD), located in the Central Office, will provide statewide oversight, guidance, and support for the federally-mandated Metropolitan Transportation Planning & Programming Process. TMPD will provide technical assistance to VDOT District Planning Managers, local jurisdictions, regional agencies, and various divisions within VDOT in the development of transportation planning documents for the MPO areas. TMPD will participate in special studies as requested.

INTRODUCTION

The Danville Metropolitan Planning Organization

The Danville Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) was designated by the Virginia Office of the Governor in July 1983 according to procedures codified in federal regulations. Its membership is composed of representatives of the City of Danville, County of Pittsylvania, and the Virginia Department of Transportation with voting rights, and the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, West Piedmont Planning District Commission, and others as non-voting.

The basic mission of the agency is overall transportation planning within a federally designated urbanized area and surrounding study area. These areas include the City of Danville and designated areas of Pittsylvania County.

Transportation Improvement Program – General

The Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is an MPO document that lists transportation projects which are reasonably anticipated to be funded by a fiscally-constrained funding stream for a period of at least four years, and which is consistent with the Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). The typical sources of projects within this document include the current Long-Range Transportation Plan and the Six-Year Improvement Program (SYIP). The TIP represents the medium by which a planning project transitions to a programmed (funded) project.

The TIP is prepared through a cooperative process that involves the Commonwealth of Virginia and local governments at several levels. Program elements are prepared by a number of agencies.

- County of Pittsylvania and City of Danville for appropriate highway, safety, and transportation improvement projects
- Virginia Department of Transportation for highway projects
- Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation for transit-related projects
- Private non-profit providers for certain transit-related projects, such as for Section 5310 vans and buses, for special needs clients

Elements and Four-Year Program Requirement

In the development of the TIP, it is required that the program cover at least a four-year effort where continuing funding from federal sources are being sought; transportation projects, regardless of funding source, and requiring an action by the FHWA or FTA because they are considered to be regionally significant must also be included in the TIP. The first year of the program has been frequently called the "Annual Element." The proposed TIP herein will cover the four fiscal years: 2023-2024 (FY 2024), 2024-2025 (FY 2025), 2025-2026 (FY 2026), and FY 2026-2027 (FY 2027) or FY 2023-2027.

Local Involvement in the Planning Process

The Danville MPO involves local governments, non-profit human services agencies, private enterprise providers of transportation services, the public, and federal and state agencies that have input into the process. More specifically, these agencies and entities are involved: City of Danville/Danville Transit System, County of Pittsylvania, state and local offices of the Virginia Department of Transportation, the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation, local taxi and bus or other private transit companies, and the public through the media representatives, public notices, and open meetings. These entities are involved in TIP preparation as early as possible. A formal notification and public notice process is employed.

Project Initiation

The initiation of projects to be included in the TIP varies depending on the project and the origination of funds used to support these projects and the local government affected. The initiation process includes:

- Urban system highway projects by local officials in the jurisdiction in which the project is located (primarily Danville).
- Other Federal Aid and State funded highways by the VDOT in consultation with elected officials in the county and city which is accomplished through the Board of Supervisors working with the local VDOT engineer.
- Danville Regional Airport projects developed by Danville and the Airport Commission in consultation with state officials.
- FTA Section 5307 grant funded capital and operating assistance projects by the City of Danville/Danville Transit System officials, in consultation with the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation.
- Special highway projects of the Commonwealth of Virginia, such as U.S. Route 58 improvements through the Virginia Department of Transportation.
- FTA Section 5310 projects by area private non-profit agencies in coordination with the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation.
- Any transportation project of regional significance, regardless of funding stream, which requires action by the FHWA or the FTA.

Final Preparation

The Danville MPO's Administrative Agent, the West Piedmont Planning District Commission, is responsible for assembling the actual document for MPO review, review by any committees, and review by the public and private sectors.

Review

The process of developing the TIP is initiated by the VDOT staff's preparation for a series of public meetings across the Commonwealth to take input on a Six Year Improvement Program document that may contain older continuing projects plus new projects for which there appears to be sufficient funding. Once the input process is complete, the staff develops a draft Six Year Improvement Program for consideration by the Commonwealth Transportation Board. Upon Board approval and when changes are made as necessary, the document is made available online to the MPO's to use in developing their TIPs.

The MPO's staff collects the information needed to develop the elements of the TIP and proceeds to the public participation phase of TIP development. The final draft TIP is reviewed in the same manner with each update, including the letters to various agencies, letters to the Project Management Team/Technical Advisory Committee, press releases, advertising, and distribution to review sites. Subsequent to the public review process and public hearing, the MPO Policy Board reviews the document again with any comments received and orders approval concomitant with any final changes. The document is also submitted to the Intergovernmental Review Process by the West Piedmont Planning District Commission and it is submitted to appropriate state and federal agency recipients, including the Virginia Department of Transportation, Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, and Federal Transit Administration.

Highway Projects Listing

Within the TIP, tables of projects are submitted that are abstracted from the local and state government approved Six Year Improvement Program database. Under regulations governing the development of MPO TIPs and Statewide TIPs, at least a four-year program of projects is required to be included in the TIP. For highway network related projects, we have included sheets with four years of project funds, and it is understood that the program years 2023-2024 (FY 2024), 2024-2025 (FY 2025), 2025-2026 (FY 2026), and FY 2026-2027 (FY 2027) count as the required four-year period to meet the requirements in the FY 2024-20247 TIP.

Unified Transportation Planning Work Program

It should be noted that the Unified Work Program (UWP), developed annually by the Danville MPO, includes projects supported with federal and state grant assistance; projects listed in that planning document are solely transportation/transit planning-type efforts and are, thus, not entered on the TIP where capital improvement-type or operating-type projects are included. However, planning projects in the UWP are supported by special planning grant assistance programs of State, Federal Highway Administration, and Federal Transit Administration. Further, to get capital and operating type funds, it is usually necessary to support their requests with a planning effort.

Basic Planning Efforts that Govern Transportation Planning Process of the MPO

Several efforts have been undertaken in the past and currently to develop essential plans for guiding the MPO in developing the TIP.

- The Danville Area Long Range Transportation Plan is an adopted plan (August 2020) for the area, developed through the MPO's Unified Transportation Planning Work Program with the City of Danville, County of Pittsylvania, the MPO, and the Virginia Department of Transportation's Transportation Planning Division as major parties. Projects for the TIP are drawn from the list of projects found in the constrained Long-Range Transportation Plan adopted by the MPO Policy Board.
- Special Transportation Corridors Studies by the MPO employing funds from the Federal Highway Administration (PL) funding program are frequently developed by the MPO. A study addressing safety and access management along Piney Forest Road in the City of Danville was completed in 2022. In late 2022, the MPO initiated a new study to investigate opportunities to improve connectivity and alignment of South Ridge Street in Danville.
- The Danville Transit Development Program Plan is updated as appropriate by Danville Transit System.

Planning Process Goals and Objectives of the MPO

The goal of the transportation planning process is to provide a multi-modal, efficient, costeffective, accessible, and safe transportation system network that has minimal adverse impacts on the environment and contributes to the future economic well-being and quality of life of the metropolitan urbanized area. Typical objectives of the program include:

- Development of a cooperative and effective intergovernmental framework for planning and managing transportation in the area.
- Maintenance of a stable and equitable system for financing improvements to the transportation network.
- Maintaining an accessible transportation network with as many diverse modes as practical and possible.
- Maintaining cost-effectiveness and efficiency as much as possible.
- Maintaining a network which minimizes adverse impacts on environmental elements while being as safe as possible.
- Maintaining a network that contributes to the economic well-being and quality of life of the MPO region.
- Maintaining a network that is accessible to disadvantaged members of the public.

Clean Air Act Conformity

The Danville Urbanized Area is not in a non-attainment area of the Commonwealth of Virginia and is thus exposed to the less stringent Clean Air Act requirements at this time.

Highway Project Funding Provisions

The Commonwealth Transportation Board is the only body of the Commonwealth empowered to allocate state highway funds to projects. The annual provisions of funds are the distributions of anticipated revenues and are based strictly on the best estimate of funds to become available during the fiscal years. Other details regarding funding allocations for VDOT projects can be obtained from VDOT. The funding plans are maintained by annual development and publication of the Six-Year Improvement Program by VDOT.

Specialized Transportation for the Elderly and Disabled

The Danville Transit System provides services to the elderly and disabled through specially equipped vehicles. The Danville area also includes provision of assistance from certain human service agencies, such as the Pittsylvania County Community Action Agency, Danville Association for Retarded Citizens, and the region-serving Southern Area Agency on Aging, that have specially equipped vehicles for people with special needs.

Federal Transit Administration Financial Capacity Policy

The Federal Transit Administration, on March 30, 1987, issued its policy on assessing the financial capability for FTA Section 5307 applicants through FTA Circular C 7008.1. The circular defines financial capability or capacity in several aspects:

- Overall current financial conditions, as documented in financial reports and reflected in working capital levels, current assets versus current liabilities, capital accounts, debt levels and trends of costs, and relevant economic indicators.
- Future financial capability, including the sufficiency, stability, and reliability of funding sources to meet future operating and capital costs.

Private Enterprise Participation in Federal Transit Administration Funded Program Efforts

The Federal Transit Administration, on October 16, 1984, issued a policy statement concerning the participation of private enterprise in FTA programs. The policy statement requires that private transit and paratransit service operators have an opportunity to present their views during the early stages of the planning process and in the development of the TIP annual element. In 1986, FTA issued documentation guidance for its Private Enterprise Participation Policy. The policy statements and procedures and public notification provisions developed for the Danville Transit System and the Danville MPO are included in processing the TIP.

Since these policies have been issued, the Federal Transit Administration has made certain amendments to regulations regarding private enterprise provider notification and participation. However, the MPO has chosen to continue to administer the program essentially as it had in the past that is allowable.

Four-Year Projections and Amendments

The succeeding enclosures of the Transportation Improvement Program include a minimum of four-year projections of funding needs where it is practical. Note that the Transportation Improvement Program may be developed annually, and a succeeding year's funding may have to be revised. In addition, developments may require the MPO from time to time to amend its Transportation Improvement Program to account for changed conditions and situations. Finally, note that with each year's update, a fiscal year is added to the program and a fiscal year deleted, as the planning periods for the Transportation Improvement Program advances. Certain changes are allowed by administrative adjustment process. Also, the utilization of grouping procedures has reduced needs for amendments.

MPO Policy: Project Selection Process/Project Priorities

For the project selection process under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA or Bipartisan Infrastructure Law) the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) development and adoption shall employ: the private provider notification process, public notice and hearing process, subsequent review of hearing comments and the comments of providers by the MPO Policy Board, consideration of adoption by the MPO Policy Board, including any special endorsements necessary.

In order to make a project selection list for this Transportation Improvement Program (FY 2024-2027) and to prioritize projects, it is agreed that: a) the project selection list shall be those projects: initiated and included in the First Year, initiated and included in Second Year, initiated and included in the Third Year, and initiated and included in the Fourth Year of the TIP and b) that those projects initiated and included in the First Year of the TIP shall be First Priority Projects, projects of the Second Year of the TIP shall be Second Priority Projects, projects of the TIP shall be Third Priority Projects, and projects of the Fourth Year of the TIP shall be First Priority Projects.

The MPO has developed this statement of policy on Project Selection and Project Prioritization to be used in this and future versions of the Transportation Improvement Program. For the current period and until amended, the Transportation Improvement Program's listings of First Year, Second Year, Third Year, and Fourth Year projects will be the Selected and Prioritized lists to be used as guidance in programming.

Since the policy was developed, the Danville MPO has proceeded toward employment of a formal public involvement program whereby public notices, direct mail notifications, notices to private enterprise providers, and a public hearing is employed in advance of the final adoption of the TIP by the MPO Policy Board.

New TIP Development Measures for FY 2024-2027 TIP

The Virginia Department of Transportation in coordination with the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration, and the various Virginia Metropolitan Planning Organizations, has developed a streamlined process for putting together the list of projects under its purview.

Certain project types will be presented <u>individually</u> such as those employing Urban Funds and Primary Funds; these are projects that involve large amounts of funds and exceed thresholds set in VDOT guidelines. On the other hand, there are other funding programs available to VDOT that will have the individual projects <u>grouped</u> together into the statewide listing. These include for example: Bridge Rehabilitation/ Replacement/Reconstruction; Rail Construction; Safety/ITS/Operational Improvements construction; Transportation Enhancement/Byways/Non-Traditional construction; Preventative Maintenance and System Preservation maintenance; Preventative Maintenance for Bridge Maintenance; and Traffic and Safety Operations maintenance projects. Recognizing that parties interested in VDOT's individual efforts in their particular area may want to see some detail on projects, VDOT has available Appendices that show the Projects by Grouping so that some detail is set out by project. These appendix tables also show Construction Districtwide (e.g. Lynchburg District), estimated financing for the grouped project categories, as well as statewide financing for the program groupings.

The two most recent federal transportation laws, IIJA/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and FAST Act establish performance measure requirements to ensure States and metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs) are investing transportation funds in projects that collectively will contribute towards the achievement of national goals. The USDOT recently published new rules for states and MPOs to collect data and establish performance targets that will support performance and outcome-based investment decisions.

The federal performance measurement requirements focus on three main areas – safety, asset management (maintenance), and system performance. Safety measures are associated with highway fatalities and injuries as well as transit fatalities; injuries; and incidents such as derailments, collisions, and fires. Asset management measures are associated with the condition of roads and bridges while system measures are associated with congestion and reliability.

Comments from all stakeholders will be considered when determining the performance measures, data sets, methodology, and targets. Statewide performance targets will be set first, in accordance with federally established compliance dates, followed by MPO establishment of performance targets.

The STIP will describe, to the maximum extent possible, the anticipated effect of the STIP toward achieving the performance targets in the following program areas: National Highway Performance Program (NHPP), Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), Congestion

Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ), and Freight Movement, along with reference to associated state plans, (i.e. State Asset Management Plan, Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), State Freight Plan, etc.).

Amendments and Adjustment in the TIP Streamlining Process

The presentation of project information and funding noted above aids the presentation of transportation project information. It also aids in streamlining the process of determining needs for full amendments of the TIP versus making administrative adjustments to the TIP. Tables included should help clarify the changes in TIP organization of projects that are now being followed by VDOT and the MPOs of the Commonwealth.

The Financial Plan

Federal regulations require that the TIP include a Financial Plan that: a) demonstrates how the TIP can be implemented; b) indicates financial resources from public and private sources that are reasonably expected to be available to carry out the program; and c) identifies innovative financing techniques to finance projects, programs, and strategies. With the assistance of VDOT, a Financial Plan will be included in this TIP to address the MPO area funding. A section called <u>TIP Financial Plan</u> has been inserted into this document.

In the section titles *Highway Elements* is the list of highway projects scheduled and accompanying state and local funding allocated during the FY 20214 to FY 2027 timeframe.

Some important points to remember when interpreting the data in the project listing charts:

- The TIP deals with federal fiscal years, not calendar years. As such, the project listing charts summarize planned expenditures for October 1 to September 30. Fiscal year 2024 begins on October 1, 2023.
- Expenditures for known programs that did not have specific projects identified at the time this document was developed are not shown, however, they will be amended into the program when the projects are identified.
- Federal Allocations include the congressionally-designated High Priority Projects Program of the IIJA/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, as well as funds passed out at the discretion of the U. S. Secretary of Transportation. These funds are typically provided for a very specific project or use. The federal discretionary projects are often not known until during the fiscal year in which they are received and may need to be amended into the TIP when they are determined.

OTHER TRANSPORTATION PROGRAMS, MODES

Enhancement Grants

The City of Danville has made Enhancement Grant Program applications for projects that have made improvements to the Dan Riverwalk Trail along the Dan River in the City of Danville.

The following describes the project/projects being sought now by the City of Danville and it is hoped the Commonwealth Transportation Board will award funding for all or part of the project being sought.

City of Danville --- Enhancement Projects:

Crossing at the Dan: Continue development of a pedestrian/bicycle trail system joining the Tobacco Warehouse District to the Downtown Historic District and throughout other areas of the city, restoration of the former passenger train station waiting area, and improvements relative to the Danville Science Center and Community Market such as pedestrian and parking improvements. Other important Enhancement projects in the City of Danville include scheduled sidewalk construction along Kemper Road and Audubon Drive, as well as pedestrian improvements along Arnett Boulevard.

City of Danville --- Revenue Share

Using Revenue Share funds, implement scheduled pedestrian improvements along Route 360 (Richmond Boulevard), on Piney Forest Road, and along Audubon Drive.

City of Danville --- Smart Scale:

Develop scheduled sidewalks, crosswalks, and bike lanes are Arnett Boulevard; sidewalks, signalized crosswalks, and transit infrastructure improvements along Riverside Drive (U.S. 58 Business) between Audubon Drive and Main Street; pedestrian improvements along Piney Forest Road; and the construction of sidewalks, signalized and unsignalized crosswalks along Piedmont Drive, Mount Cross Road, Enterprise Drive, Old Mount Cross Road, Collins Drive, and Lowes Drive.

General Projects

Improvements are needed to be made to the W Main Street corridor between Danville Expressway extending to the east of the new Caesars Casino site, to include vehicular safety improvements; bicycle, sidewalk, and crosswalk improvements and accommodations; and modifications to an existing railroad crossing the corridor to enhance safety and minimize conflicts between trains and automobiles.

TIP FINANCIAL PLAN

Introduction

The IIJA/Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's planning regulation 23 CFR 450.326(m) specifies the inclusion of a financial plan in the TIP that shows how the projects or project phases identified in the TIP can reasonably be expected to be implemented, with the available public and private revenues identified. TIP projects or project phases are required to be consistent with the long-range plan and must be fully funded in the TIP. To the extent that funding is available or shall be reasonably available, priority projects or project phases have been cooperatively selected for inclusion in this TIP. VDOT, VDRPT, the Danville Transit System, and the Danville MPO have cooperatively developed financial forecasts for the TIP based on the latest official planning assumptions and estimates of revenue(s) and cost(s). The financial information is given by funding category for the Fiscal Year 2024.

Table C presents anticipated fiscally-constrained funding projections for Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2024 – 2027 by year, as well as the total amount of funding expected in the columns on the right over the entire period of this TIP. Sources of funding shown in this table include Federal, Other, Statewide, and Maintenance. These sources are further categorized by individual programs which are abbreviated (please see the name of the programs in Glossary of Terms above).

Some projects listed in the TIP may show \$0 for planned obligations. There are several reasons this may occur and include:

- Project is complete, awaiting closeout
- Subsequent phases beyond four years
- Information only, funding being pursued
- Project to be funded from [category] group funding

In addition to construction projects, financial projections have also been made to show revenues for maintaining and operating the region's highway system during the same four-year period. Funded TIP actions typically include, but are not limited to:

- Transportation studies
- Ground transportation system improvement projects (fixed-guide, highway, bicycle, pedestrian, commuter lots, etc.)
- System maintenance (monitoring, repair and/or replacement of system facilities and support sites; snow removal; mowing; painting; rest area or weigh station sites; etc.)
- System operations (ITS-TSM applications; traffic operations such as signalization, signal coordination, ramp meters, or message signs; roadside assistance; incident management; for the urbanized TMAs, their Congestion Management Process activities; VDOT traffic management centers; bridge-tunnel management; toll road or congestion pricing management; etc.).

The Danville MPO submits this letter to the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) to fulfill the March 2016 FHWA final rulemaking (23 CFR 490) for National Performance Measures for the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) target setting requirements. The Safety Performance rulemaking requires MPOs to agree to contribute to meeting the State DOT safety targets or to establish safety targets for each of the five safety measures including number of fatalities, rate of fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles traveled (VMT), number of serious injuries, rate of serious injuries per 100 million VMT, and number of non-motorized fatalities and non-motorized serious injuries.

The selected methodology and selected targets are outlined below acknowledging acceptance to support the VDOT statewide annual goal percent change, to set a numerical target for each performance measure specific to the MPO planning area, or any combination of these two methods for all five safety performance targets.

By establishing MPO safety targets, we agree to plan and program projects to contribute toward reducing fatalities and serious injuries on the transportation system.



Danville-Pittsylvania MPO submits this letter to the Office of Intermodal Planning and Investment (OIPI) to fulfill the target setting requirements of the Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA) January 2017 final rulemakings for National Performance Measures for asset condition and system performance. This letter satisfies the federal requirement for MPOs to report targets to their respective State DOT "in a manner that is documented and mutually agreed upon by both parties" (23 CFR §§490.107(c)(1)). Documenting the targets in this letter also allows for the State to provide MPO targets to FHWA, upon request, satisfying a reporting requirement of State DOTs (23 CFR §§490.105(f)(9)).

In accordance with 23 CFR §§490.105 and 490.107, targets for twelve federally mandated asset condition and system performance measures must be established and reported to FHWA every four years, beginning in 2018. Federal regulations require both State Departments of Transportation and Metropolitan Planning Organizations to set targets for the twelve measures (23 CFR §§490.105, 490.307, 490.407, 490.507, 490.607, 490.707, and 490.807).¹ The rule requires MPOs to establish targets by either (1) "agreeing to plan and program projects so that they contribute toward the accomplishment of the relevant State DOT target" or (2) "committing to a quantifiable target for that performance measure for their metropolitan planning area" (23 CFR §§490.105(f)(3)). By supporting any of the State targets, we agree to plan and program projects to contribute toward achieving the State target.

WHEREAS, inclusion of transportation projects in the *Transportation Improvement Program* is a condition of federal participation in the funding of projects and programs; and

WHEREAS, the *Transportation Improvement Program* has been prepared to initiate review by the Danville-Pittsylvania Metropolitan Planning Organization (Danville MPO) of proposed transportation improvements for fiscal years 2021 - 2024; and

WHEREAS, the administrative amendment of the 2021-2024 TIP incorporates an additional \$4,313,741 in preventative maintenance for bridges funds for projects to be identified, an additional \$26,725,567 in preventative maintenance and system preservation funds for projects to be identified, and an additional \$1,908,362 in traffic and safety operations funds for projects to be identified.



INTRODUCTION

The Danville Metropolitan Planning Organization

The Danville Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) was designated by the Virginia Office of the Governor in July 1983 according to procedures codified in federal regulations. Its membership is composed of representatives of the City of Danville, County of Pittsylvania, and the Virginia Department of Transportation with voting rights, and the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, West Piedmont Planning District Commission, and others as non-voting.

The basic mission of the agency is overall transportation planning within a federally designated urbanized area and surrounding study area. These areas include the City of Danville and designated areas of Pittsylvania County.

Transportation Improvement Program - General

The Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is an MPO document that lists transportation projects which are reasonably anticipated to be funded by a fiscallyconstrained funding stream for a period of at least four years, and which is consistent with the Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). The typical sources of projects within this document include the current Long-Range Transportation Plan and the Six-Year Improvement Program (SYIP). The TIP represents the medium by which a planning project transitions to a programmed (funded) project.

The TIP is prepared through a cooperative process that involves the Commonwealth of Virginia and local governments at several levels. Program elements are prepared by a number of agencies.

- County of Pittsylvania and City of Danville for appropriate highway, safety, and transportation improvement projects
- Virginia Department of Transportation for highway projects
- Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation for transit-related projects
- Private non-profit providers for certain transit-related projects, such as for Section 5310 vans and buses, for special needs clients

Elements and Four-Year Program Requirement

In the development of the TIP, it is required that the program cover at least a four-year effort where continuing funding from federal sources are being sought; transportation projects, regardless of funding source, and requiring an action by the FHWA or FTA because they are considered to be regionally significant must also be included in the TIP. The first year of the program has been frequently called the "Annual Element."

The proposed TIP herein will cover the four fiscal years: 2020-2021 (FY 2021); 2021-2022 (FY 2022); 2022-2023 (FY 2023); and FY 2023-2023 (FY 2024) or FY 2020-2024.

Local Involvement in the Planning Process

The Danville MPO involves local governments, non-profit human services agencies, private enterprise providers of transportation services, the public, and federal and state agencies that have input into the process. More specifically, these agencies and entities are involved: City of Danville/Danville Transit System, County of Pittsylvania, state and local offices of the Virginia Department of Transportation, the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation, local taxi and bus or other private transit companies, and the public through the media representatives, public notices, and open meetings. These entities are involved in TIP preparation as early as possible. A formal notification and public notice process is employed.

Project Initiation

The initiation of projects to be included in the TIP varies depending on the project and the origination of funds used to support these projects and the local government affected. The initiation process includes:

- Urban system highway projects by local officials in the jurisdiction the project is located in (primarily Danville).
- Other Federal Aid and State funded highways by the VDOT in consultation with elected officials in the County and City which is accomplished through the Board of Supervisors working with the local VDOT engineer.
- Danville Regional Airport projects developed by Danville and the Airport Commission in consultation with state officials.
- FTA Section 5307 grant funded capital and operating assistance projects by the City of Danville/Danville Transit System officials, in consultation with the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation.
- Special highway projects of the Commonwealth of Virginia, such as U.S. Route 58 improvements through the Virginia Department of Transportation.
- FTA Section 5310 projects by area private non-profit agencies in coordination with the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation.
- Any transportation project of regional significance, regardless of funding stream, which requires action by the FHWA or the FTA.

Final Preparation

The Danville MPO's Administrative Agent, the West Piedmont Planning District Commission Executive Director, is responsible for assembling the actual document for MPO review, review by any review committees, and review by the public and private sectors.

Review

The process of developing the TIP is initiated by the VDOT staff's preparation for a series of public meetings across the Commonwealth to take input on a Six Year Improvement Program document that may contain older continuing projects plus new projects for which there appears to be sufficient funding. Once the input process is complete, the staff develops a draft Six Year Improvement Program for consideration by the Commonwealth Transportation Board. Upon Board approval and when changes are made as necessary the document is made available online to the MPO's to use in developing their TIPs.

The MPO's staff collects the information needed to develop the elements of the TIP and proceeds to the public participation phase of TIP development. The final draft TIP is reviewed in the same manner each year, including the letters to various agencies, letters to the Project Management Team/Technical Advisory Committee, press releases, advertising, and distribution to review sites. Subsequent to the public review process and public hearing exposure, the MPO Policy Board reviews the document again with any comments received and orders approval concomitant with any final changes. The document is also submitted to the Intergovernmental Review Process by the West Piedmont Planning District Commission and it is submitted to appropriate state and federal agency recipients, including the Virginia Department of Transportation, Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, and Federal Transit Administration.

Highway Projects Listing

Within the TIP, tables of projects are submitted that are abstracted from the local and state government approved Six Year Improvement Program database. Under regulations governing the development of MPO TIPs and Statewide TIPs, at least a four-year program of projects are required to be included in the TIP. For highway network related projects, we have included sheets with four years of project funds, and it is understood that the program years 2020-2021 (FY 2021); 2021-2022 (FY 2022); 2022-2023 (FY 2023); and FY 2023-2023 (FY 2024) count as the required four-year period to meet the requirements in the FY 2020-2024 TIP.

Unified Transportation Planning Work Program

It should be noted that the Unified Work Program (UWP), developed annually by the Danville MPO, includes projects supported with federal and state grant assistance; projects listed in this planning document are solely transportation/transit planning type efforts and are, thus, not entered on the TIP where capital improvement type or operating type projects are included. However, planning projects in the UWP are supported by special planning grant assistance programs of State, Federal Highway Administration, and Federal Transit Administration. Further, in order to get capital and operating type funds, it is usually necessary to support their requests with a planning effort.

Basic Planning Efforts that Govern Transportation Planning Process of the MPO

A number of efforts have been undertaken in the past and currently to develop essential plans for guiding the MPO in developing the TIP.

- The Danville Area Long Range Transportation Plan is an adopted plan (October 2015) for the area, developed through the MPO's Unified Transportation Planning Work Program with the City of Danville, County of Pittsylvania, the MPO, and the Virginia Department of Transportation's Transportation Planning Division as major parties. The Plan's last update was completed in October 2015; a new update is due for adoption in August of 2020 and is currently in the process of being revised at the time of adoption of this TIP document. Projects for the TIP are drawn from the list of projects found in the constrained Long-Range Transportation Plan adopted by the MPO Policy Board.
- Special Transportation Corridors Studies by the MPO employing funds from the Federal Highway Administration (PL) funding program are frequently developed by the MPO. A study addressing safety and access management between Piedmont Drive in the City of Danville and Long Circle Drive at the western boundary of the MPO in Brosville is currently underway and will have outputs that can be used in the next Long Range Transportation Plan Update. In 2019 the MPO completed a study to examine the feasibility of a connector road between the US 58 Bypass and the Southern Virginia Mega Site at Berry Hill. This study was utilized as the planning justification for funding this project which was approved by the Commonwealth Transportation Board (CTB) in 2019.
- The Danville Transit Development Program Plan was completed in recent years and is updated as appropriate by Danville Transit System.

Planning Process Goals and Objectives of the MPO

The goal of the transportation planning process is to provide a multi-modal, efficient, cost-effective, accessible, and safe transportation system network that has minimal adverse impacts on the environment and contributes to the future economic well-being and quality of life of the metropolitan urbanized area. Typical objectives of the program include:

- Development of a cooperative and effective intergovernmental framework for planning and managing transportation in the area.
- Maintenance of a stable and equitable system for financing improvements to the transportation network.
- Maintaining an accessible transportation network with as many diverse modes as practical and possible.
- Maintaining cost-effectiveness and efficiency as much as possible.
- Maintaining a network which minimizes adverse impacts on environmental elements while being as safe as possible.

- Maintaining a network that contributes to the economic well-being and quality of life of the MPO region.
- Maintaining a network that is accessible to disadvantaged members of the public.

Clean Air Act Conformity

The Danville Urbanized Area is not in a non-attainment area of the Commonwealth of Virginia and is thus exposed to the less stringent Clean Air Act requirements at this time.

Highway Project Funding Provisions

The Commonwealth Transportation Board is the only body of the Commonwealth empowered to allocate state highway funds to projects. The annual provisions of funds are the distributions of anticipated revenues and are based strictly on the best estimate of funds to become available during the fiscal years. Other details regarding funding allocations for VDOT projects can be obtained from VDOT. The funding plans are maintained by annual development and publication of the Six-Year Improvement Program by VDOT.

Specialized Transportation for the Elderly and Disabled

The Danville Transit System provides services to the elderly and disabled through specially equipped vehicles. The Danville area also includes provision of assistance from certain human service agencies, such as the Pittsylvania County Community Action Agency, Danville Association for Retarded Citizens, and the region-serving Southern Area Agency on Aging, that have specially-equipped vehicles for people with special needs.

Federal Transit Administration Financial Capacity Policy

The Federal Transit Administration, on March 30, 1987, issued its policy on assessing the financial capability for FTA Section 5307 applicants through FTA Circular C 7008.1. The circular defines financial capability or capacity in several aspects:

- Overall current financial conditions, as documented in financial reports and reflected in working capital levels, current assets versus current liabilities, capital accounts, debt levels and trends of costs, and relevant economic indicators.
- Future financial capability, including the sufficiency, stability, and reliability of funding sources to meet future operating and capital costs.

Private Enterprise Participation in Federal Transit Administration Funded Program Efforts

The Federal Transit Administration, on October 16, 1984, issued a policy statement concerning the participation of private enterprise in FTA programs. The policy statement requires that private transit and paratransit service operators have an opportunity to present their views during the early stages of the planning process and in the development of the TIP annual element. In 1986, FTA issued documentation guidance for its Private Enterprise Participation Policy. The policy statements and procedures and public notification provisions developed for the Danville Transit System and the Danville MPO are included in processing the TIP.

Since these policies have been issued, the Federal Transit Administration has made certain amendments to regulations regarding private enterprise provider notification and participation. However, the MPO has chosen to continue to administer the program essentially as it had in the past that is allowable.

Four-Year Projections and Amendments

The succeeding enclosures of the Transportation Improvement Program include a minimum of four-year projections of funding needs where it is practical. Note that the Transportation Improvement Program may be developed annually and a succeeding year's funding may have to be revised. In addition, developments may require the MPO from time to time to amend its Transportation Improvement Program to account for changed conditions and situations. Finally, note that with each year's update, a fiscal year is added to the program and a fiscal year deleted, as the planning periods for the Transportation Improvement Program advances. Certain changes are allowed by administrative adjustment process. Also the utilization of grouping procedures has reduced needs for amendments.

MPO Policy:

Project Selection Process/Project Priorities

For the project selection process under the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act) the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) development and adoption shall employ: the private provider notification process, public notice and hearing process, subsequent review of hearing comments and the comments of providers by the MPO Policy Board, consideration of adoption by the MPO Policy Board, including any special endorsements necessary.

In order to make a project selection list for this Transportation Improvement Program (FY 2020-2024) and to prioritize projects, it is agreed that: a) the project selection list shall be those projects: initiated and included in the First Year, initiated and included in Second Year, initiated and included in the Third Year, and initiated and included in the Fourth Year of the TIP and b) that those projects initiated and included in the First Year of the TIP shall be First Priority Projects, projects of the Second Year of the TIP shall be

Second Priority Projects, projects of the Third Year of the TIP shall be Third Priority Projects, and projects of the Fourth Year of the TIP shall be Fourth Priority Projects.

The MPO has developed this statement of policy on Project Selection and Project Prioritization to be used in this and future versions of the Transportation Improvement Program. For the current period and until amended, the Transportation Improvement Program's listings of First Year, Second Year, Third Year, and Fourth Year projects will be the Selected and Prioritized lists to be used as guidance in programming.

Since the policy was developed, the Danville MPO has proceeded toward employment of a formal public involvement program whereby public notices, direct mail notifications, notices to private enterprise providers, and a public hearing is employed in advance of the final adoption of the TIP by the MPO Policy Board.

New TIP Development Measures for FY 2021-2024 TIP

The Virginia Department of Transportation in coordination with the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation, the Federal Highway Administration, and the various Virginia Metropolitan Planning Organizations, has developed a streamlined process for putting together the list of projects under its purview.

Certain project types will be presented *individually* such as those employing Urban Funds and Primary Funds; these are projects that involve large amounts of funds and exceed thresholds set in VDOT guidelines. On the other hand, there are other funding programs available to VDOT that will have the individual projects grouped together into These example: statewide listing. include for Bridge Rehabilitation/ the Replacement/Reconstruction; Rail Construction; Safety/ITS/Operational Improvements Transportation Enhancement/Byways/Non-Traditional construction; construction: Preventative Maintenance and System Preservation maintenance; Preventative Maintenance for Bridge Maintenance; and Traffic and Safety Operations maintenance Recognizing that parties interested in VDOT's individual efforts in their projects. particular area may want to see some detail on projects, VDOT has available Appendices that show the Projects by Grouping so that some detail is set out by project. These appendix tables also show Construction Districtwide (e.g. Lynchburg District), estimated financing for the grouped project categories, as well as Statewide financing for the program groupings.

The two most recent federal transportation laws, MAP-21 and FAST Act establish performance measure requirements to ensure States and metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs) are investing transportation funds in projects that collectively will contribute towards the achievement of national goals. The USDOT recently published new rules for States and MPOs to collect data and establish performance targets that will support performance and outcome based investment decisions.

The new federal performance measurement requirements focus on three main areas – safety, asset management (maintenance), and system performance. Safety measures are associated with highway fatalities and injuries as well as transit fatalities; injuries;

and incidents such as derailments, collisions, and fires. Asset management measures are associated with the condition of roads and bridges while system measures are associated with congestion and reliability.

On October 1, 2019 Virginia submitted to the U.S. Secretary of Transportation the required Initial State Performance Report. This report describes performance management efforts currently underway in Virginia and highlights the State's commitment to investing limited transportation funds in the best manner possible. Virginia is currently reviewing the Final Rules associated with the performance measure requirements; along with available data sources to determine the best manner in which to establish the required performance targets. VDOT will work with DRPT, MPOs, PDCs, and other agencies to discuss the methodology, assumptions, and possible targets.

Comments from all stakeholders will be considered when determining the performance measures, data sets, methodology, and targets. Statewide performance targets will be set first, in accordance with federally established compliance dates, followed by MPO establishment of performance targets.

In future years the STIP will describe, to the maximum extent possible, the anticipated effect of the STIP toward achieving the performance targets in the following program areas: National Highway Performance Program (NHPP), Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ), and Freight Movement, along with reference to associated state plans, (i.e. State Asset Management Plan, Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP), State Freight Plan, etc.).

Amendments and Adjustment in the TIP Streamlining Process

The presentation of project information and funding noted above aids the presentation of transportation project information. It also aids in streamlining the process of determining needs for full amendments of the TIP versus making administrative adjustments to the TIP. Tables included should help clarify the changes in TIP organization of projects that are now being followed by VDOT and the MPOs of the Commonwealth.

The Financial Plan

Federal regulations require that the TIP include a Financial Plan that: a) demonstrates how the TIP can be implemented; b) indicates financial resources from public and private sources that are reasonably expected to be available to carry out the program; and c) identifies innovative financing techniques to finance projects, programs, and strategies. With the assistance of VDOT, a Financial Plan will be included in this TIP to address the MPO area funding. A section called <u>*Transportation Improvement Program</u>* <u>*Financial Plan*</u> has been inserted into this document.</u>

Some important points to remember when interpreting the data in the project listing charts:

• The TIP deals with fiscal years, not calendar years. As such, the project listing charts summarize planned expenditures for October 1 to September 30. Fiscal year 2021 begins on October 1, 2020.

• Expenditures for known programs that did not have specific projects identified at the time this document was developed are not shown, however, they will be amended into the program when the projects are identified.

• Federal Allocations include the congressionally-designated High Priority Projects Program of the FAST Act and Demonstration projects of pre-FAST Act authorizations, as well as funds passed out at the discretion of the U. S. Secretary of Transportation. These funds are typically provided for a very specific project or use. The federal discretionary projects are often not known until during the fiscal year in which they are received and may need to be amended into the TIP when they are determined.

- System maintenance (monitoring, repair and/or replacement of system facilities and support sites; snow removal; mowing; painting; rest area or weigh station sites; etc.)
- System operations (ITS-TSM applications; traffic operations such as signalization, signal coordination, ramp meters, or message signs; roadside assistance; incident management; for the urbanized TMAs, their Congestion Management Process activities; VDOT traffic management centers; bridge-tunnel management; toll road or congestion pricing management; etc.).

Mr. Hoback opened the meeting at 4:01 p.m., and introduced himself. He noted that the purpose of the virtual public meeting was to obtain citizen input for, and entertain questions regarding, the draft FY 2021 – 2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) document for the Danville Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). Appendix D: Performance Based Planning and Programming – Safety Performance Measures

Performance Targets

In accordance with the requirements of MAP-21 and the FAST Act, Virginia has established safety performance objectives as published in <u>Virginia's 2017 -2021Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP)</u> and, starting in 2017, annual targets in the Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) Annual Report. The SHSP performance measure objectives are indicated in Table 1 below.

For safety performance measures 1, 2, and 3, annual targets are developed collaboratively by the

Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Highway Safety Office (HSO) and VDOT HSIP staff.¹ The DMV HSO includes these measures in their Highway Safety Plan submitted to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) every June.

The Commonwealth Transportation Board approves all five annual targets and VDOT includes these in the HSIP Annual Report submitted to FHWA every August. Within 180 days of VDOT's annual report submission to FHWA, MPOs must indicate their support of the state targets or submit their unique regional targets for one or more of the safety measures.

Connection to Other Performance Based Planning Documents

The federally required SHSP, a five-year multi-agency comprehensive plan focused on reducing fatalities and serious injuries on all public roads, serves as the coordinating document for other plans and programs that involve traffic safety. This coordination involves the long-range statewide transportation plan (LRSTP), the metropolitan transportation plans (MTP), and three plans that implement parts of the SHSP – the Highway Safety Plan (HSP), the HSIP, and the Commercial Vehicle Safety Plan (CVSP). This integration is important for improving overall

safety coordination amongst various partners and leads to more comprehensive transportation safety planning.

The LRSTP, VTrans2040, guides the state's investment decisions for transportation improvements. Safety and performance management is included in the VTrans2040 Vision, Goals & Objectives, and Guiding Principles:

Guiding Principle 2: Ensure Safety, Security, and Resiliency – Provide a transportation system that is safe for all users, responds immediately to short-term shocks such as weather events or security emergencies, and adapts effectively to long-term stressors such as sea level rise.

Guiding Principle 5: Ensure Transparency and Accountability, and Promote Performance Management – work openly with partners and engage stakeholders in project development and implementation, and establish performance targets that consider the needs of all communities, measure progress towards targets, and to adjust programs and policies as necessary to achieve the established targets.

Goal C: Safety for All Users – provide a safe transportation system for passengers and goods on all travel modes.

Objectives:

- Reduce the number and rate of motorized fatalities and serious injuries.
- Reduce the number of non-motorized fatalities and injuries.

MTPs are similar to the LRSTP however a MTP covers a specific metropolitan planning area. MTPs include goals and objectives for their respective areas/regions and identify strategies for advancing long-term transportation investments in a specific region.

The HSP is an annual plan to address highway user behaviors that will improve safety through education and enforcement campaigns. The HSP and associated NHTSA grants are administered through the Highway Safety Office at the DMV. Furthermore, each year Virginia State Police (VSP) submits a Commercial Vehicles Safety Plan (CVSP) to Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration as a requirement of obtaining related enforcement grants.

How do Safety Projects get selected for inclusion in the STIP?

The HSIP project planning and delivery follows these steps:

Each year highway segment and intersection locations that have the highest potential for safety improvement are identified based on the previous five years of traffic crash and volume data. These above average crash locations are provided to the VDOT Districts to determine appropriate locations and countermeasures for HSIP funding. The potential for vehicle-train crashes at each at-grade railroad crossing is also distributed.

HSIP project proposals are submitted through the SMART Portal for the appropriate safety program.

VDOT and locality submitted HSIP proposals are reviewed and prioritized based on the number of targeted crashes and the benefit to cost ratio or the potential risk reduction for non-motorized and rail highway grade crossing improvements.

Projects are selected and programmed for the last two or three years of the SYIP. At present there are over \$100 million of safety improvement proposals, with an expected benefit, that remain unfunded.

In recent years, programmed priority HSIP projects have shifted from being higher cost spot intersection and segment improvements to lower cost systemic improvements that target specific crash types and/or roadway characteristics that are factors in crashes across the network. Examples of systemic improvements include traffic signal devices and timing at intersections and curve signing, higher friction surfaces and rumble strips on segments.

Safety improvements are also included within projects funded with non-HSIP funds. The SMART SCALE scoring and prioritization process for inclusion of projects in the SYIP, considers safety benefits from improvements addressing travel of all modes. Many of the large SMART SCALE projects, upon completion, will have distinct impacts on safety performance in the Commonwealth. In addition, projects funded through other state and federal sources in the SYIP, such as the Transportation Alternatives Program, including Safe Routes to School grants, Revenue Sharing, and even some CMAQ and maintenance projects, will also have crash reduction benefits that contribute to improved safety performance.

Thus, the funding to meet Virginia's safety objectives and targets is allocated to projects in the CTB approved SYIP, and is consistent with VTrans2040. Since the SYIP is the foundation for the STIP, the program of projects in the STIP demonstrates support to achieve Virginia's safety performance objectives and targets and is consistent with Virginia's SHSP and the HSIP.
